Coastal Canara Bank and Syndicate banks to merge; to be 4th largest bank

NEW DELHI: After Vijaya Bank was merged with Dena Bank and Bank of Baroda (BoB), three other banks which had its genesis in the undivided district of Dakshina Kannada are all set to merge.

Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman on August 30 announced the merger of 10 public sector banks. "Canara Bank will be merged with Syndicate Bank. Indian Bank will be merged with Allahabad Bank. PNB, OBC and United Bank will be merged and PNB will be the anchor bank. Union Bank of India, Andhra Bank and Corporation Bank will be merged," she declared.


"In place of fragmented lending capacity with 27 public sector banks in 2017, now there will be 12 public sector banks post the latest round of consolidation of PSU banks. The consolidation of public

sector banks will give them scale," Sitharaman said.

After the merger, Canara Bank and Syndicate Bank will be 4th largest public sector with bank ?15.2 lakh crore business. Consolidated Union Bank India, Andhra

Bank and Corporation Bank will be the 5th largest public sector banks with Rs 14.6 lac crore business.

Indian Bank and Allahabad Bank will be the 7th largest public sector bank with Rs 8.08 lac crore business after merger.



Bothe the coastal banks are set to merge very shortly as announced by Ms Sitharaman.

Last year, the government had approved the merger of Vijaya Bank and Dena Bank with Bank of Baroda (BoB) that has become effective from April 1, 2019. In 2017, the State Bank of India absorbed five of its associates and the Bharatiya

Plaster of Paris Ganesha idols not allowed for immersion, says Pollution Board

MANGALORE: In a notification sent out to the public, Karnataka Pollution Control Board has banned the immersion of Ganesha idols in any kind of water bodies during the upcoming Gauri Ganesha festival.

The notification says, "During the Gauri Ganesha festival, the public should celebrate the festival with Ganesh idols made of mud and without colours. These should be immersed only in water bodies specified by the local authorities.During the immersion of the idols in mobile tanks and other water sources, the flowers, fruits, plantain, mango leaves or any other decoration that is put on the idols should be removed before immersion"."Permission is given to make idols from mud to a maximum height of five feet only.

The immersion of idols made of plaster of paris that are painted is completely prohibited by the board," reads the notification.

The board has directed local bodies in the State to inspect

idols in their jurisdictions. If plaster of Paris idols are found, they should be confiscated and destroyed at landfill sites of the local body concerned.

The communication sent out by deputy commissioners of both the districts of Dakshina Kannada and Udupi has asked the citizens to cooperate in order to maintain cleanliness of the environment.

Dr K Sudhakar, Chairman of KSPCB, said, "The Ganesha Chaturthi gaining prominence in the state and we (Board) have taken many measures to popularise the use of ecofriendly Ganesha idols."
