





The research unit on plant tissue culture was one of the pioneering tissue culture laboratories in India in fact, it was among the first eighteen such laboratories to be introduced within this country. Since then, the laboratory has had several firsts to its credit, all of which have been construed under the careful direction of Dr Leo D Souza.

The Laboratory of Applied Biology has been recognized as the Research Centre of PG Biotechnology under Mangalore University.

1. The Laboratory of Applied Biology has been receiving research grants from various government funding agencies like:

Department of Science and Technology (DST), Indian Council of Agriculture Research (ICAR), Department of Environment (DOE), University Grants Commission (UGC), Council of Scientific and Industrial Research (CSIR), DST- FIST, USAID (through Centre for Technology Development), Agriculture Technologies, Bangalore. Dr W Koppers Italy. Mangalore Jesuit Ed. Society Synergy Mangalore Department of Biotechnology (DBT), Department of Atomic Energy (DAE- BRNS).

2. Over the last five years we have had projects from DBT and BRNS.

- **DBT** – National programme on recovery of red listed species endangered plant *Coscinium fenestratum* through application of Biotechnological tools. Rs 13,42,000/-.

Centre for Social Concern

In order to make our students socially conscious and build their responsibility towards the society, the College has established “Centre for Social Concern”. There are two full time qualified persons in the department. The Centre has adopted nine villages on the outside of the city. The Centre helps in Social development by creating SHGs. Students from the College constantly visit the villages and become partners in their development. The objective of the centre is to create awareness programmes like talks, health camps etc. The nine villages are Kannur, Jelligudda, Faisalnagar, Bajal, Veeranagar, Jyothinagar, Shanthinagar and Padpu.

- Women empowerment programmes are initiated.
- Short films are screened highlighting social evils and social problems.
- Promotions of inter dialogue for tolerance and harmony.
- Camps such as Pediatric, Dental, Medical, Dermatology, Nutrition.
- Awareness talks on Dengue, Malaria and AIDs are conducted.
- Talks on government schemes, Right to Education, Self Employment are conducted.
- Days of national infrastructure are celebrated by our students in the schools of these villages.
- Distribution of rice, books and other daily utensils for the poor.
- Career guidance programmes is conducted for high school students in these villages.

About 41 special programmes were conducted by the Centre for Social Concern during 2013-14.

Konkani Institute of St Aloysius College, Mangalore

Konkani Institute is one of the prestigious institutions run by St Aloysius College which aims at development of Konkani Language and Literature. The seeds of this language were sown by Rev. Fr Anjelo Maffei SJ who prepared the first Konkani Grammar handbook in 1882. He also prepared a Konkani – English lexicon.

In the year 1980, the Konkani Institute was established with Rev. Fr Herbert Noronha SJ as the Director. “Amar Konkani” a bi-annual research journal was started under the editorship of late VJP Saldanha, a Konkani Scholar. The Journal is published in two scripts Kannada and Devanagari.

PGDK: (Post Graduate Diploma in Konkani):

It is a two year full pledged course through distant education. It was started in the year 1997. As on today, there are more than 500 awardees for this diploma programme. Presently 11 students are pursuing PGDK programme. The institute has benefited by the Grant in Aid twice given by staff CIIL Mr Edwin JF D’Souza, the Director of the Institute is the member of Sahitya Akademi, New Delhi. He is the member of BOS of Goa University Konkani Department. In June 2014 the novel of Mr Edwin J F D’Souza “Kallam Bhangaar” was awarded the best book of 2013. Mr Gopal M Gowda is the Coordinator of Kunbi Folklore Artiste is the other staff who is also incharge of Konkani Library.

Aloysian Boy's Home

The Aloysian Boys Home, Kotekar is an outreach social project started as a in 1981 as a centenary project of St Aloysius College, Mangalore. It is a **Rehabilitation home for boys**. It is recognized and licensed by the Department of Women and Child Welfare, Government of Karnataka as. 1. "Fit Person Institute" meant for delinquents who come to us from the Remand Home these are children who are delinquents or children of parents who are in jail for various offences. 2 "Destitute Cottage "for children from single parent families where one of the parents is dead, left the family or mentally ill etc. The children are brought up together and their background is not revealed to anyone. The children are sent to a school run by the parish where they learn to mix with other children. The focus of the institution is the all round formation of these disadvantaged children to turn them into well educated and well trained citizens of the country. The institution has an Area of 10, 40 acres including the Play ground. There are 8 buildings

- 1) Administrative building housing the Office, staff rooms, prayer room kitchen, hall, and library etc.
- 2) 12 Cottages housing the children.
- 3) Worker's room
- 4) Bus/jeep shed/ generator room
- 5) Laundry, Big Cowshed
- 6) Pigsty
- 7) Poultry
- 8) Fire wood shed

The Institution is funded partly by the Women and Child Welfare Department and partly by the Management of St Aloysius College.

- There are currently totally 78 children (35 children in the Fit institution and 43 children in the destitute cottage. All are resident and are housed in 8 cottages having around 7 to 8 children in each under the supervision of a house mother. Rev Sr Ida Mendonca the Superior with four sisters, a house father, five house mothers, cooks, farm workers formed the staff. All the children attend school. 52 are in the primary school, 31 are in the High School, 1 is in the PUC and 2 are doing their Industrial Training.
- Importance is given to co curricular activities. The main games the children like to play are cricket and volleyball. Many children win prizes at sports events organized by the school. In the Mini Olympics Games organized for the orphanage children by the Mangalore Rotarians, our children won several prizes. Provision is also made for indoor games like caroms, ludo etc.

- Besides schooling and formal education the children receive training in yoga, dancing, singing, drawing and playing musical instruments depending on their ability and interest. The children presented a Christmas Concert at the Midnight Mass of St Aloysius College. The children's band is invited to play at the Graduation Ceremony of the College every year.
- Former students have done well in life. Some of them have completed their graduation even with distinction and some have completed their masters. Many who could not do academic studies have completed their training in the St Technical Aloysius Industrial Training Institute and have been employed by reputed companies.
- Students of St Aloysius College visit the Home to mix with them, teach them spoken English and to play games with them. The interaction is specially promoted by the activities of various associations of the College and the SAHAYA project.

Pathways Programme

‘Pathways’ is a programme in the College sponsored by the Centre for the Study of Culture and Society, Bangalore through their project on Higher Education Innovation and Research. The project began its activities from 20th Aug. 2010. The project aims to undertake a series of campus initiatives related to questions of social justice and diversity to achieve enhanced student awareness and changes in the institutional culture resulting in increased sensitivity to social justice issues. Every year 2 staff members are trained to conduct the activities of the Pathways Cell by conducting seminars and workshops in CSCS office in Bangalore. A batch of 24 I year degree students from less privileged socio-economic background were selected and trained in computer literacy, social media, internet, email handling etc. Various competitions for the students were held like essay competition, debate competition, collage competition etc. to spread the message of social justice among students.

‘Sangathya’ an inter-collegiate Pathways fest was conducted on 26th February 2011. Various competitions like Picture Puzzle Competition, Wealth out of Waste, Film Review, Group discussion, Street play, Inter religious Quiz, Dance and collage competitions were held. Students from 9 colleges from Mysore, Kumta and DK participated. Environment related activities were held in collaboration with the Microbiology students association.

The second year activities of the Pathways Cell started with the first meeting of the selected batch of 20 first year students on 20th June 2011. The selected students were trained in soft skills, social media and internet browsing. As the part of the activities a collage competition on Social Justice and Environment Protection was held on 6th July 2011. 30 teams comprising of 3 members in a team, participated. Vanamahotsava Day was observed on 15th July 2011 in collaboration with various association of the college to stress the need for environment protection and to spread the awareness of the importance and concern towards the Mother Nature and its environment. A seminar for the class representative and students leaders of the college was conducted on 27th July, 2011 with the theme ‘Leadership Through Social Justice’. A seminar was conducted for the Pathways students on motivation. Interclass essay writing

competition on corruption, social harmony, and farmers struggle for justice and poetry writing competition on environment and national integrity were conducted.

A 3 day workshop on photo-documentation and Cartography was conducted for the Pathways students from 2nd to 4th November 2011 with the themes 'Language Diversity' and 'Bridging the Gap Between Affluent and the marginalized'. A follow up programme on 'Digital Mapping Initiatives' was held on 30th January, 2012. An essay writing competition for the students was held on 16th February 2012, with the topics 'Challenges to Bridge the Linguistic Disparities in the Modern Context' and 'Education as the Catalyst of Change for Equal and Just Society'.

In the second year the Pathways students have taken up two projects: 'The Study of the Linguistic Diversity of Mangalore City and the 'Study of the Rich-poor Divide' and to present the results in photo-documentation and charts. A series of programmes were held for the staff members to spread the message of Social Justice and to sensitize the whole campus on Social Justice Issues. Staff members as well as the selected pathways students were trained in the basic research methods. 9 students took up various projects to work on social justice related issues with the staff guidance.

A one day workshop on best practices to enable linguistic and social skills were held for the benefit of the students with linguistic difficulties was held on 31st July 2012. A one day inter collegiate seminar on 'Film as Social Commentary' was held on 30th July 2012. A 3 day workshop for the Pathways students on social awareness, project preparation, research and presentation was held on 9-11, August 2012. A seminar on 'Research Methodology' on 20th August 2012, on 'Photography' on 5th Jan 2013 and 'Training in Documentary and Videography' was held on 9th Jan 2013.

In the third year of the project again 20 students were selected and trained in social awareness. They were trained how to take up study projects and do research by conducting workshops. Two important research projects were taken up by the Pathways students: 'Study of Bengre' and 'Study of the Govt. Primary Schools in Mangalore'. Students were guided by the staff and the results of the projects were brought out in the form of documentaries. The Life

of Bengre – a fishing community was depicted in the documentary called ‘Alegalu’. The study also includes a ‘Photo Journal’ and some articles published. The other group of students who studied the government schools brought out another documentary called ‘Patshala’ and also a photo journal. Both these documentaries were released and were shown to a large gathering where the government officials, local fishing community leaders and policy makers were present. Programmes called ‘Diganta’, ‘Spandana’ and ‘Campus Darshan’ were also held for the benefit of students. Pathways Cell of the College also collaborated with other associations of the College – like Human Rights Cell, Women’s Cell etc. to conduct various human rights and gender equity related awareness activities and seminars.

The Pathways students participated in a Regional Workshop at A V Baliga College, Kumta on 25-26 June, 2013. A national level 3 days conference was also held at New Delhi for the Pathways cell co-coordinators in which the new problems and prospects of higher education were discussed based on the campus activities of the pathways students and the response of other student to these kind of activates.

The project was successfully concluded after 3 years of hectic activities for the Pathways students and also the student community at large. The students were trained to look into the problems in a different perspective where the socio-economic backwardness, linguistic barriers, economic disparities, gender equity, environment problems were given importance. The basic aim was to bring awareness of Social Justice in Higher Education in the College campus through Pathway Cell activities was successful. The selected students learned many skills like use of computers, social media, internet, photography, videography, documentaries, basic research methods, presentations, project writing etc. and were able to understand social justice needs and the role of students so that they can act as catalysts of change to bring about a just and human society.

St Aloysius College Advanced Research Centre

St. Aloysius College Advanced Research Centre is affiliated to Tumkur University. It was inaugurated by Prof Balaram on 02-06-2012. Dr Richard Gonsalves is the Director of the Research Centre.

- To create an awareness among Aloysian Alumni that they have an objective to work for the betterment of underprivileged. Rector of St Aloysius institution is the Patron while the Principal of St Aloysius College is the director of SACAA. The association is managed by the Executive Committee which has about 20 members. Until 1990, Rector was the President. Only in the year 1991, the President ship was given to the Alumni.

2. Activities:

The Association organizes SACAA talks, conducts SACAA picnic, Cricket and Throw ball tournaments, Aloysian reunion. The Aloysian Teaching and non teaching staff are felicitated on completion of 25 years once in two years. It also conducts a felicitation programme of Eminent Aloysians. St Aloysius College Teachers' Co-Operative Credit Society Ltd

St Aloysius College Teachers' Co-operative Credit Society Ltd was registered on 13th February 1976. All Aided Staff and Management Staffs of St Aloysius Institutions who have completed 6 years of service can become 'A' class members and who have completed 3 years of service can become 'C' class members. At present there are 246 'A' class members and 48 'C' class members. The society has elected board of 9 directors including a Secretary. The principal of St Aloysius College is the ex officio President.

Loan facilities:

The society offers loan facilities to all the members of the society. There is Surety Loan (5 times of salary), Additional Surety Loan (3 times of salary), Vehicle Loan, Property Loan, NSC Loan, Deposit Loan, Education Loan, and Month end loan at very reasonable rate of interest at 10 to 10.5 percent per annum. In the year 2013-14 an amount of Rs.1,20,15,250/- was disbursed as loan.

Deposit Schemes:

The society also offers various deposit schemes for all the members. There is fixed deposit for 3 years, 1 year fixed deposit, 6 months fixed deposit, short term deposit, recurring deposit and special recurring deposit at moderate rate of interest at 7 to 9.5% per annum. Under Special recurring deposit scheme, medical facility is attached.

Family welfare fund:

'A' class member can join special recurring deposit schemes and can avail benefits after one year of joining the scheme.

The special recurring deposit scheme benefits are medical checkup for the member and spouse, a maximum of Rs.800/- each per year and medical bills reimbursement for the member, spouse and his children below the age of 21 years, a maximum of Rs.50,000/- per year, after deducting 10% of salary of member and spouse from the total bills.

- Every 'A' class member can have shares worth Rs.10,000/- in the society. We are giving 15% to 25% as dividend. Yearly, every member is given a gift of Rs 250/-
- Presently Rev.Fr Swebert D'Silva S.J. is the President and Dr Richard Gonsalves is the Secretary of the society.

St Aloysius College-Community College Scheme

The 12th Five Year Plan Document of the Planning Commission has laid a special emphasis on expansion of skill-based programmes in higher education. It recommends setting up of Community Colleges(CC)to serve multiple needs, including(i) career oriented education and skills to students interested in directly entering the workforce(ii) contracted training and education programmes for local employers; (iii)high –touch remedial education for secondary school graduates not ready to enroll in traditional colleges, giving them a path to transfer to three of four year institutions; and (iv) general interest courses to the community for personal development and interest. The Plan Document also states the Community Colleges will be located to afford easy access to underprivileged students and such colleges could either be established as affiliated colleges of universities or as entirely autonomous institutions.

As per the Communication of UGC New Delhi dated 6 Sep 2013 (No. 1-35/2013(CC) the college has been granted status of Community College to begin two Certificate Courses in Computer Animation and Multimedia and Travel and Tourism with an approve intake of 20 each in 2013-14. Accordingly we started the programme in November 2013 and completed it successfully with active participation of our Industry partners. Some of our Industry partners are:

Our industry partners helped us in designing the course content, planned the testing and evaluation method and assisted our students in field visit.

As per the Communication of UGC New Delhi dated 4 sep 2014, our Community College Scheme has been extended with introduction of two One -year diploma courses in Computer Animation and Multimedia and Travel and Tourism with an intake of 50 students each. Accordingly we have began these programmes.

Aloysian Employees Housing Cooperative Society Ltd, Mangalore

Aloysian Employees Housing Co-operative Credit Society Ltd. was registered on 23rd January 1984. All Aided Staff and Management Staffs of St Aloysius institutions who have completed 6 years of service can become 'A' class member and who have completed 3 years of service can become 'C' class member. At present there are 181 'A' class members and 22 'C' class members. The society has elected board of 9 directors including a secretary. The principal of St Aloysius College is the ex officio President.

Loan facilities:

The society offers loan facilities to all the members of the society. There is Housing Loan, Deposit loan, and Surety loan at very low rate of interest at 10 percent per annum. At a time when it was difficult to get housing finance from any other source, the society helped the members to have houses of their own by giving loans without any hassles. In the year 2013-14 an amount of Rs.71, 67,500/- was disbursed as loan.

Insurance Fund:

The housing loan has been made risk free, by providing it with life insurance cover.

Deposit schemes:

The society also offers various deposit schemes for all the members and non members. There is 1 year fixed deposit, 6 months fixed deposit, short term deposit, and recurring deposit at moderate rate of interest at 7 to 9.5% per annum.

Other facilities:

There is also provision for Members Children Education Fund and Death cum-disability Fund.

Every 'A' class member can have shares worth Rs.30,000/- in the society. We are giving 10% to 22% as dividend.

Presently Rev. Fr Swebert D'Silva S.J is the president and Dr Alwyn D'Sa is the Secretary of the society.

Community Radio Sarang 107.8 FM

Community Radio Sarang 107.8 FM of St Aloysius College, Mangalore – 575003 was inaugurated on 23rd September 2009 by his Excellency, Hans Raj Bharadwaj, Governor of Karnataka. Sarang means Harmony of Colours. At present the Radio Station is on AIR for 16 hours, morning 6 am to night 10 pm. It broadcasts in Kannada, Konkani, Tulu and Beary Languages. Sarang gives importance to local culture and local languages.

- Sarang airs both live and recorded programmes. Some of the live programmes are: Jana Dari (voice of the people), Olavina Haadu (songs of love), Hrudaya Raga (song of the Heart) and Adu Aata Adu (Play games over the radio). All live programmes are very popular and hundreds of people participate in these programmes with phone INS.
- The Recorded Programmes include Folk Songs, Devotional songs, Yakshagana (Dance Drama), Short plays, Short stories, Interviews with local artists etc.
- A one hour live weekly feedback programme helps the College to cater to the needs of the local communities.
- In mid 2013, NCSTC of DST sanctioned a major grant of Rs.14.60 Lakhs to Radio Sarang on to broadcast programmes on Women's Health and Nutrition. This Project was launched on Oct 2, 2013. An input of 15 to 17 minutes concerning women's health is given over the Radio from Monday to Friday. Live Phone in programmes with Doctors taking questions on women's health issues are held on Saturdays. This one hour programme is broadcasted again on Sundays. Health checkup camps and health awareness camps are held every month.
- Sarang Radio has been able to bond with the local communities and feedback from the simple people is very encouraging.
- The Transmitter capacity of Radio Sarang is 50 Watts. It is supposed to reach an audience in the radius of 10 kms but it goes much beyond this range and in far off places people have installed special antennas to receive the signals of Radio Sarang.
- Sarang Radio is financially supported by the College. The Government of Karnataka has given 'adhoc' grants of over Rs.5 Lakhs during the last 5 years.
- The Youthful and dynamic staff (RJs) are largely responsible for the success of the Radio Station. The Radio Sarang has won second place at national level and third place at national level in the year 2012 and 2014 respectively for promoting local culture.

St Aloysius College Cooperative Stores

The St Aloysius College Cooperative Stores was started in the year 1961 under section 7 of Mysore Cooperative Societies Act of 1959. It has Nine Directors out of which six are student directors and three staff directors. Rev Fr Principal is the Ex officio President and Mr Paul D'Souza (Staff) is the Honorary Secretary. It has 2 members as the staff working for it.

Objectives:

- It encourages self help.
- Purchase of articles to carry on the working stores.
- Dissemination of the knowledge of Cooperative principles and realization as far as practicable.

Every year the stock of the stores is evaluated and books of accounts are audited. Any major decision is taken in the AGM of the stores. Every year Two I year students are selected who continue for 3 years. The Board of Directors have monthly meeting to discuss the working of stores.
