IQAC has initiated a learning program that intends to maximize the strengths, values & acumen that go beyond the subject matter of expertise to be the best. A 3-level module called "Certificate in Teaching Excellence" includes Foundation, Intermediate & Train the Trainer levels of learning and development. Each module consists of 30 hours hybrid blended contact program with evaluations. The 3-level module Program inducts staff in the following categories: • (Level -1) The Foundation Program: All new staff in their probation will have to clear Level - 1 which is the Foundation course. This also counts as a criterion for probation evaluation and confirmation. • (Level -2) Intermediate program: Staff who have joined in the last 5 years were introduced directly to Level -2. • (Level -3) Train the Trainer Program: Staff who have qualified from the Intermediate Program qualify for the TTT Program

Student/ Leadership Development Programme was scheduled in association with AIACHE on the theme "Re-Imagining Internationalization on 22 January 2022 to all the Students across Karnantaka. more than 500 Students were present for Leadership Development Programme. Faculty Development Programme was scheduled in association with AIACHE on the theme "Re-Imagining Internationalization on 20 and 21 January 2022 to all the Principals and Teachers across Karnantaka. 15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

The New Educational Policy (NEP) has brought with its optimistic and constructive changes in the educational model that supports broader, multidisciplinary holistic and skill-based curriculum adequate to meet the vocational needs of a learner. The College has implemented the NEP 2020 with effect from 2021-2022. The policy has been adopted as per NEP Regulations, 2021. The College has proposed and approved its Institutional NEP policy in the Statutory Academic Council and the Governing Bod. The general structures of academic programmes and courses proposed by the state and affiliating university are adopted with credit allocations. The College offers Multidisciplinary curriculum which includes Discipline Specific Core Courses, Discipline Specific Electives, Open Electives, Ability Enhancement Courses, Skill Enhancement Courses, Value Based Courses, Yoga, Health & Wellness, Sports, Physical Fitness, Cocurricular & Extra-curricular Courses. Modules on service to humanity, volunteering, human rights and gender equity are introduced to drive the

vision and mission of the institution. The College has adopted two major system for Sciences and Humanities as per the state and university regulations, 2021. Along with Core Courses, the students are offered value added courses. The collaborative activities undertaken in the institution have the scope to widen the perspectives of the students and make them capable of accustoming them to the different zones of learning. The infrastructure of the college enables to hold and conduct multidisciplinary research activities in the campus and trigger their interest and potential in manifold subject areas

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

Academic Bank of Credit is a digital storehouse that supports and encourages student mobility across Higher Education Institutions. St Aloysius College (Autonomous) follows the principle of flexibility in learning by providing choice-based education system for the students. The college is registered under 'NAD Digi locker' which is the first step in this regard. This online digital storehouse of credits will facilitate, check the credits earned by the students. It has the technological and infrastructural facilities that support the successful implementation of the ABC system in the institution. Once implemented, the students will have the option to enter/exit educational institutions based on their credits. As per the objectives of the ABC system, the college has already invested good efforts at its student-centric and learner-friendly approaches. The curriculum also offers sufficient time and convenience for the students for the successful completion of the course programs of their choice. The college looks forward to the internationalization of education and has MOUs with various other institutions for cooperative initiatives. They can currently obtain additional credits through pursuits including sports and yoga, To improve their learning experience, students are encouraged to enroll in and successfully finish courses via online platforms like Swayam and Coursera

17. Skill development:

Skill development schemes occupy prime concern during the yearly curriculum revision process. The College has been selected under the DDU KAUSHAL KENDRA (DDUKK) for promoting vocational education. Six B.Voc. programmes are offered under DDUKK. Every department offers certificate courses specifically to inculcate employability and skill development. The extra and co curricurricular association functioning in the college and the different units like NSS, NCC and the sports activities are capable of imparting skills. The students are offered more than 40 value added courses and several vocational courses based on skills through offline and online modes. The institution provides capacity-building programs and skill inculcation training programs to all students under the guidance of Placement and Training Cell. All programs offered at St Aloysius College (autonomous) has an internship/project/field work integrated to it. The intention behind

This ensures that the students understand the prominence of the event and absorb the essence of the nation through these activities. The units of NSS and NCC functioning actively in the college ensures that all the students are given awareness and opportunity to practice their social and national commitment as the young generation of the country. The activities are well defined and have produced exceptional results leading the NCC unit to be honoured as the 'Best in the State' during the academic year 2021-22.

The Outcome Based Education approach is one pedagogical model adopted by the institution in delivering quality enhanced curriculum to our learners. The curriculum designed with each course demarcated with specific Course Outcomes (CO), Program Outcome (PO), and Program Specific Outcome (PSO) becomes accountable not just to the educational needs of the learners but also satiates the requirements of the employment sector by delivering skilled and educated professionals. An efficiently organised package of academic and professional gratification is our promise of adopting OBE into the curriculum. The IQAC of the college takes measures to make certain that all the faculty and the students are aware of this new and productive pedagogical method through regular FDPs for the faculty and awareness sessions for the students. Through this, the institution has been able to shift the focus from teacher centred mode of learning to student-centred learning. The college is also technologically competent by integrating Qnsmarti software in the examination section which aids in generation of outcome-based question papers based on the Blooms Taxonomy and evaluatory modes that analyse the student progression in terms of remembering, understanding, applying, analysing, evaluating and creating.

1.3 - Curriculum Enrichment

PRINCIPAL

1.3.1 - Institution integrates cross-cutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability, and Human Values into the curriculum

Every course of the existing programmes makes an earnest effort to integrate the crosscuttingissues of ethics, gender, human values, and environmental sustainability. The first four semesters contain foundation courses in Indian Constitution, Gender Equity, Human Rights, and Environmental Sciences which are mandatory. Further, students are enlivened to explore the other possibility of reaching out to society through association activities and Sahaaya.

Professional Ethics: A total of 410 courses have integrated professional ethics into the curriculum. All the Post- Graduate programmes have incorporated a course Research Methodology containing research ethics.

Gender: Promotion of Gender sensitivity is done through various courses, association activities, research projects, and co-curricular activities of the college. A total of 103 courses promoted gender issues.

Human values: The curriculum guides the student towards humanism, tolerance, peace, and harmony. The extra-curricular and co-curricular (EC/CC) activities are incorporated as part of the curricula to facilitate hands-on training for these cross-cutting issues. Further, 246 courses specifically illustrate human values.

Environment and Sustainability: 218 courses speak on environment and sustainability. Some of the student activities at the EC/CC level include Ethnobotanical studies showcasing the rich ecological domain of the region.

The solid waste are segregated and disposed of as per local municipality guidelines in separate colour-coded bins. Colour coded bins are placed to collected the specific wastes. Green: wet and biodegradable, Blue: plastic and non-biodegradable waste and Yellow: paper and glass pieces.

The biodegradable waste like leaf litter and other organic waste are used in vermicomposting by using vermicomposting unit maintained by the Dept. of Zoology.

Chemical waste of the laboratories such as acids/ bases is neutralized before disposal. Chemicals, heavy metal-containing chemicals are reduced, concentrated, solidified and disposed of as solid waste. Biological waste generated in the laboratories is decontaminated in the autoclave. Microbial/ contaminated cultures are decontaminated/washed separately and disposed of following standard protocol.
