CAMPUS: "The students of this generation are very much influenced by media and this is the cause for many psychic diseases and the increase in number of suicides," said P V Bhandary, consultant psychiatrist of A V Baliga Memorial Hospital, Udupi. He was addressing the PG students on the topic 'Every change is a challenge for youth: Are you ready?' at SAC on Wednesday.

The seminar was hosted by MSW department with an aim of bringing awareness among students about their mental and behavioural changes.

Dr Bhandary stressed on the working of human brain and how every human being looks and interprets things differently. "Emotions develop first

and then come the judgement. Human brain matures only at the age of 24. Till the age of 24, the first and important thing seen in students is rebelliousness," he added.

He made a clear statement that one of the serious problems that students are facing is the anxiety disorders. "Teens require around nine hours of sleep per night in order to avoid mental illness. One out of four college students suffers from mental illness. The common symptoms seen are increased worrying, difficulty in concentrating, tension, and headache. Anxiety is caused when they feel helpless to control their worries. The different types of anxieties seen in students are social anxiety, exam anxiety, depression and suicide. Interpersonal conflicts,
